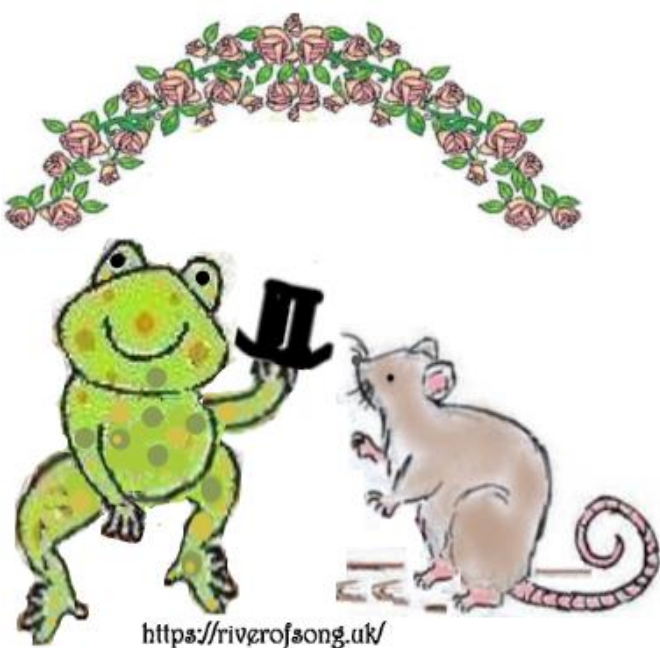
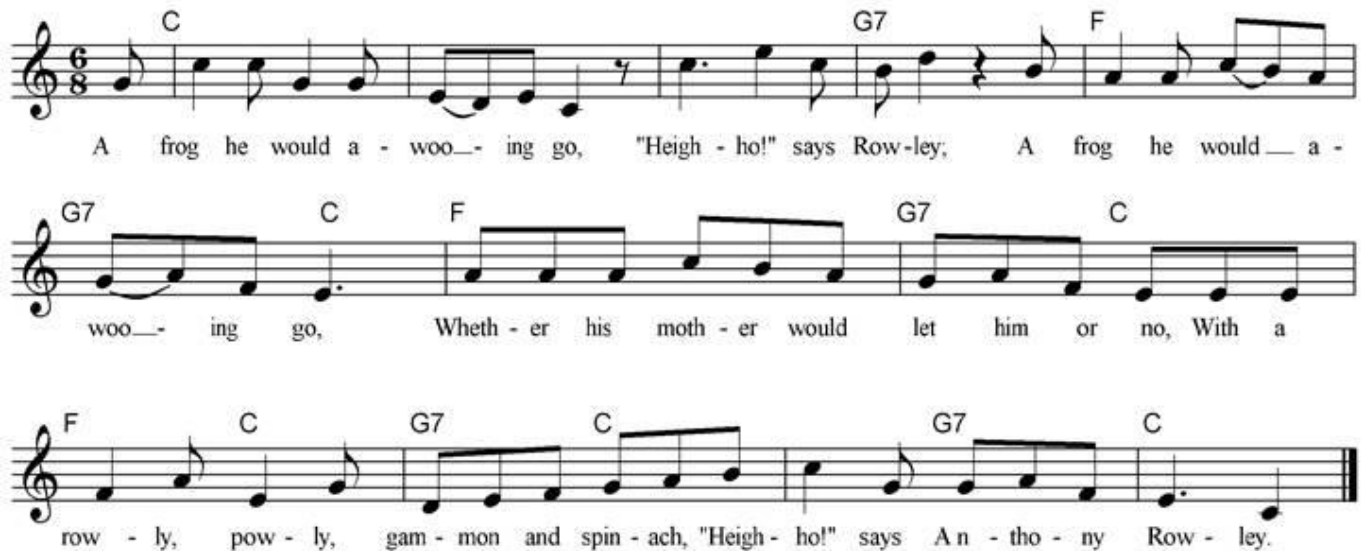


A frog he would a-wooing go
